Every General Assembly tells the story of JCI Ibadan in a different way.

The July General Assembly will perhaps be remembered entirely for the feeling of being surrounded by generations of people who continue to shape the identity of this organisation.

The gathering opened in the familiar rhythm of every JCI Ibadan GA.

Members renewed their commitment through the JCI Creed and adopted the minutes of the previous meeting before settling into the business of the day. The first learning session challenged members to think beyond professional success and pay equal attention to personal wellbeing.

In a practical session on **Smart Nutrition: A Guide to Energy, Fitness and Longevity**, JCI Sen. Iwalola Akin-Jimoh reminded members that sustainable leadership begins with healthy living, a message that resonated with many in the room.

From there, the atmosphere shifted as the General Assembly welcomed the Personality of the Month, **JCI Sen. Babajide Olatunde Agbeja**. What followed was one of the most engaging conversations of the evening.

His reflections on excellence, discipline, work-life balance and the importance of paying attention to details drew thoughtful questions from members and generous applause throughout the session. More than sharing lessons from his journey, he challenged members to pursue excellence so consistently that opportunities would naturally find them.

The appreciation that followed was heartfelt. Speaking on behalf of the League of Past Presidents, **JCI Sen. Kayode Adedayo** reflected on the enduring legacy of JCI Sen. Babajide Agbeja and the respect he has earned across the organisation over the years. He reminded members that many of the opportunities JCI Ibadan enjoys today are built on foundations laid by those who came before, making the evening not just a celebration of one leader, but a celebration of legacy itself.



In response and acknowledgement of the Mid-year Review newsletter edition, (Half-time), JCI Sen. Babajide Agbeja left the house with another gift.

He announced that **BOFF&CO Insurance and Brokers Ltd** would sponsor the JCI Ibadan Newsletter for the next three years, reaffirming his belief that the stories of the organisation deserve to be documented and preserved for generations of Jaycees to come.

The announcement was received with excitement and gratitude, especially by the Editorial Board, whose work continues to capture the history of the chapter one edition at a time.

The General Assembly also welcomed **seven new members** into the JCI Ibadan family. Following their induction, they took the oath of membership and were officially received by the League of Past Presidents, marking the beginning of their own journey of leadership, service and fellowship within the organisation.

As the meeting progressed, chairmen of upcoming projects presented their plans of action, inviting members to support initiatives including the **Iyiola Folayan Training Retreat, Access to Quality Health, and Corporate Training.**



Directors and board members also presented progress through their mid-year reports from their respective portfolios, highlighting milestones achieved across membership development, welfare, media, legal affairs, business opportunities, training and community impact.

The reports reflected an organisation steadily advancing its programmes while remaining focused on delivering value to members and the communities it serves.

One of the most encouraging moments came during the comments from the League of Past Presidents. While offering thoughtful recommendations on governance, accountability and continuous improvement, they also commended Mr President for his openness, commitment to transparency and the progress recorded in the first half of the administrative year. It was another reminder that constructive feedback and sincere appreciation can exist side by side when everyone is working towards the same goal.

As announcements were made, the marketplace buzzed with conversations and members gradually dispersed; another General Assembly had come to an end.

But, like every JCI Ibadan family gathering, the conversations did not end when the meeting was adjourned.

They simply continued in smaller circles, in shared laughter, in handshakes, and in the quiet merriment of GA 2, sharing the confidence that JCI Ibadan family would gather again next month.



THE ELDER SPOKE

"Young People Are Not Detailed Anymore."



There are moments during every General Assembly when the room naturally becomes quieter. Not because anyone asks for silence, but because everyone recognises that something worth listening to is about to be said.

That moment came during the **Personality of the Month** session as **JCI Sen. Babajide Agbeja**, Past President of JCI Ibadan, took the microphone for an interactive Question & Answer session.

What followed was less of an interview and more of a conversation between an elder and his family.

Without slides, notes or rehearsed speeches, he drew from decades of leadership, entrepreneurship and service, offering lessons that were practical, sometimes humorous and often deeply reflective.

His opening response to the first question asked immediately set the tone of our journey to our elder's wisdom:

"Young people are not detailed anymore."

This statement drew smiles across the room, but it was quickly followed by a moment of reflection.

Excellence, he explained, begins with the little things.

The way a report is written, the way a task is completed, the way even the cleaner cleans the floor and workers conduct themselves. To him, details are never insignificant because they reveal discipline, preparation and respect for excellence.

As the conversation continued, he shifted from professional excellence to personal values. He spoke passionately about the importance of home training, respect for elders and the character that should define young leaders.

Success, he reminded members, is not built solely on intelligence or qualifications but on the values people carry with them long after they leave home.

When asked about career growth and work-life balance, he reflected on his own journey with remarkable honesty.

There was a time, he admitted, when he believed working longer hours was the only path to success. His days started early, ended late and revolved almost entirely around work, but experience eventually taught him a lesson he wished every young professional would understand.

"Hard work alone does not pay; you have to work smarter."

He encouraged members to look beyond routine tasks, intentionally build relationships, create opportunities and position themselves where opportunities can find them. Success, he says, is not only about effort but also about strategy.

The room laughed again when the conversation turned to leisure.

He spoke about playing volleyball during his university days, enjoying weekends with friends, and looking forward to Mondays because he genuinely loved his work.

"All work and no play makes you a dull boy and a dull girl."

His message was simple: build a successful career, but do not forget to build a fulfilling life.

Perhaps the most thought-provoking moment came when he spoke about wealth.

Rather than measuring success by how hard someone works, he challenged members to think differently about financial freedom.



"You become rich when you are sleeping, and money is entering your account."

Using practical examples, including the importance of insurance and protecting personal assets, he encouraged members to develop financial intelligence and create systems that continue to generate value beyond their daily labour.



"How many of you have your phones insured... steal my phone and I will get a brand new one the next day...."

As the session drew to a close, one final lesson lingered.

Reflecting on how he assessed the people he worked with, he explained that excellence is never a destination.

For everyone seated in the room that afternoon, the session became far more than an opportunity to ask an elder questions. It was a reminder that leadership is shaped by discipline, success is sustained by continuous learning, and growth begins the moment we decide that yesterday's best is not enough.

And like every meaningful conversation with an elder, members left with more than answers to their questions; we all left with principles to live by.

ACCESS TO JUSTICE PROJECT

Building Hope, One Life at a Time

A thriving family is known not only by how it celebrates its own, but by how it stands for those who have no one else to stand with them.

That is the heart of the JCI Ibadan **Access to Justice Project**.

Since the beginning of this administration, the project has continued to restore hope to vulnerable inmates who would otherwise remain behind bars because of poverty, inadequate legal representation or an inability to meet bail conditions. So far, **five inmates have regained their freedom** through the intervention of the JCI Ibadan Access to Justice Team.

Among them are **Zainab Adesina**, released in **May 2026**; **Adewumi Boluwatife**, released in **June 2026**; **Omowumi Joseph**, discharged in **June 2026**; and **Hamsat Abduhlai**, alongside another inmate, both discharged in **July 2026**.

Behind each name is a story of restored dignity.

One story that deeply touched the team was that of **Zainab Adesina**.

During a visit to the Agodi Correctional Centre, the team encountered a young mother holding her infant, a baby only a few months old who was still breastfeeding. Both mother and child were living behind prison walls.



Zainab was not a violent offender. She was a wife, a mother and a small-scale entrepreneur whose business suffered severe financial setbacks. Unable to repay a debt as agreed, a civil financial challenge gradually became a criminal matter. Without the resources to secure legal representation or satisfy her bail conditions, she was remanded in custody, and because her baby depended entirely on her, the child entered the correctional facility with her.

The JCI Ibadan Access to Justice Team immediately took up her case. Working with volunteer legal counsel, **Barr. Olubunmi Apantaku**, the team reviewed the matter, provided legal representation and worked diligently to facilitate her release.

On 20 May 2026, Zainab walked out of the Agodi Correctional Centre with her baby in her arms and hope restored. She was received by representatives of the project team, including **JCIN Amb. Oluwaseun Ajayi**, First Vice President of JCI Ibadan, and our Project Chairman, **JC Victoria E. Olatunde**.

Her release marked more than the end of a period of incarceration. It marked the beginning of a second chance.



Since regaining her freedom, Zainab has honoured every court appearance, remained committed to meeting her legal obligations and expressed her determination to rebuild her life. She now seeks the opportunity to restart her small business, providing for her family while fulfilling her repayment commitments with dignity.

As the Access to Justice Project continues, every case reminds us that justice is not only about applying the law; it is also about restoring hope where it has been lost. Sometimes, the difference between despair and a fresh start is simply a community willing to stand beside someone when they need it most.

FAMILY MEETING

Every family needs time to have those deep conversations that cannot be held during the rush of a general meeting agenda or between motions on the floor, but in a setting where conversations can breathe, ideas can be challenged, and everyone feels comfortable enough to contribute.

That is the spirit behind the July Confab 2026.

The afternoon began on a cheerful note: call to order, JCI Creed and National Pledge, recognition, amendment and adoption of the last July Confab held. Then, before anyone spoke about strategy or leadership, members were drawn into a light-hearted interactive engagement session led by the Confab Project Chairman, JC Feyisara Ajagbe. Past Presidents became the centre of a lively "truth or lie" challenge, and for a while the room was filled with laughter, friendly guesses and playful banter. It was a simple activity, but it reminded everyone that meaningful conversations are often built on genuine connections and understanding one another beyond the surface level.

As the mood settled, attention turned to the Business of the Day.

The Strategic Plan Review became the foundation for an engaging discussion that invited members to think beyond the current administrative year. Questions were raised about implementation, accountability and how the organisation can ensure that good plans do not remain on paper. Members reflected on leadership succession, institutional memory, documentation, recruitment, member welfare and satisfaction, and the importance of building systems that will serve future administrations as much as the present one.

The conversation drew contributions from across the room.



Past Presidents shared lessons from their own administrations, reminding members that leadership is not something reserved for elected officers but a responsibility carried by everyone. They encouraged newer members to understand JCI's mission and values, build meaningful friendships beyond the General Assembly, and prepare themselves for opportunities to serve whenever they arise.

There were practical suggestions too. Members discussed creating better systems for tracking strategic objectives, preserving organisational records, strengthening welfare initiatives, intentionally recruiting younger professionals and ensuring that future leaders inherit not just projects, but strong institutions. It was less about finding immediate answers and more about asking the right questions together.

The atmosphere became lighter again when the floor was opened for declarations of intention ahead of the next administrative year. **JCIN Amb Olajumoke Adelabu** declared her intention to run for JCI Nigeria Executive Vice President, **JCIN Amb. Happy Ezem Innocent** declared for President, **JCIN Amb. Yusuf Gboyega** and **JCIN Amb. Ibrahim Oredola** declared for Executive Vice President, while **JC Mateen Adeniyi**, **JC Adewale Adegunju**, and **JCIN Amb Adedapo Akinola** signified their intention to contest for the position of Vice President.

The announcements were received with warm applause, laughter and the good-natured humour that has become part of every family gathering. The Confab also witnessed the constitution of the **Independent JCI Electoral Committee (IJEC)**, another important step in preparing for a smooth leadership transition.

By the end of the afternoon, no one had all the answers, but everyone had been part of the conversation.

And perhaps that is what makes **Ìpàdẹ̀ Ẹ̀bí** worth returning to.

It is a space where ideas are tested, experiences are shared, and the future of JCI Ibadan is shaped—not by one voice, but by the collective wisdom of the family gathered under the same tree.

This principle has continued to shape the way he leads, the way he serves and the way he lives.

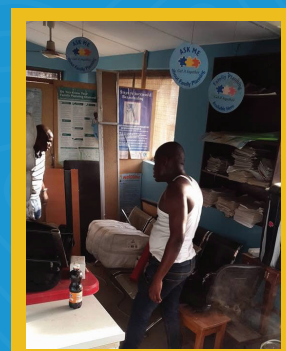
To the new members just beginning their own journey in JCI Ibadan;

The 30-Second Security Check: *Is Your Digital Identity Protected?*

In today's interconnected world, a single compromised password can lead to financial loss, operational disruption, and reputational damage. Cybersecurity is no longer just an IT concern—it is a business imperative.

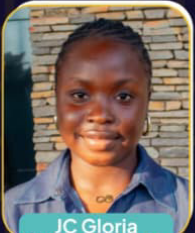
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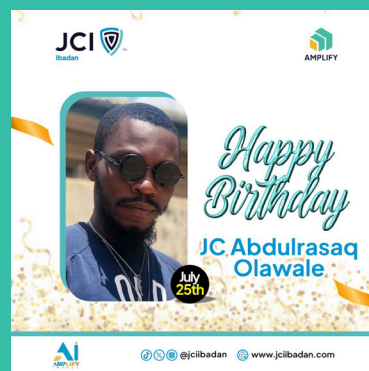
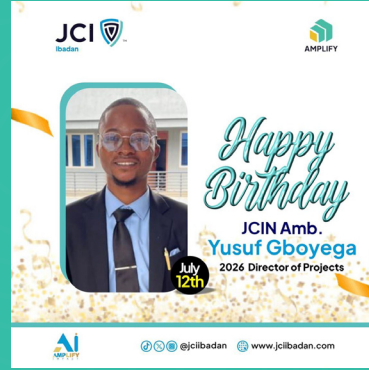
